The Center for Community Justice announces the 45th anniversary of the Victim Offender Reconciliation Program (VORP). In 1978, a landmark moment for the criminal justice system in the United States, VORP was launched in Elkhart County, IN, the first restorative justice program in the United States. This significant milestone marks a transformative shift towards a more compassionate, healing-centered approach to addressing crime and its aftermath.

Based on restorative justice, the VORP program promotes dialogue, understanding, and accountability between victims, offenders, and communities. Restorative justice empowers those affected by crime to actively participate in the resolution process, fostering healing, restitution, and accountability to prevent future offenses. This program has been replicated across the United States to build a fairer, more inclusive society emphasizing rehabilitation and reintegration over punitive measures.

This anniversary celebrates the enduring success of restorative justice principles. Since its inception, VORP has provided a platform for victims and offenders to engage in open, constructive dialogue, offering healing and support for participants and encouraging transformative changes for people who have caused harm. The program's impact has resonated deeply within communities nationwide by fostering empathy, responsibility, and personal growth.

Furthermore, the RJA Dinner will bring together criminal justice professionals, advocates, survivors, and individuals who believe in the power of healing through reconciliation.
